Major Trends

- The COVID-19 pandemic is allowing all forms of transnational crime to flourish:
 - particularly online fraud, calls to defraud individuals
- Sale of counterfeit goods instead of the real goods needs for protection during the pandemic—overlap with supply chains for rogue pharmaceuticals
- Opioid deaths are growing despite disruption of supply chains for narcotics
- Human trafficking is flourishing online and increasingly on the streets in certain US cities despite social isolation
- Increase in environmental crime in many parts of the world—illegal timber and poaching are key elements
- Criminal actors are often willingly or being coerced into collaboration with the state







Responses

- Analysis is needed of the networks that are facilitating online sale of narcotics and the networks that are distributing drugs in the pandemic
- Counterfeit PPE sellers need to be examined through large scale data analytics and network analysis
- The transformation of human trafficking and enhanced vulnerability of youth needs greater attention and resources including online activity
- Networks that combine both state and non-state actors need to be studied. This is imperative as crime is increasingly a tool of state policy
